Crime prevention

About the MOT test

An MOT test pass confirms that when the vehicle was examined as specified in Section 45 of the Road Traffic Act 1988, it met the minimum legal requirements. It doesn't mean that the vehicle fully meets all legal requirements or that it will continue to be roadworthy for the next year. It's your responsibility to make sure the vehicle remains safe to drive on roads.

Vehicle condition

If within 28 days of the test (three months for rust or corrosion related problems) you think that the vehicle shouldn't have passed its MOT test, contact DVSA by telephone on 0300 123 9000.
